WEEKLY BRIEFING

(01 January to 22 June 1981)

This briefing includes the operational capabilities, peace and order situation as compared to the preceding period, home defense accomplishment, special operation, on-going operations, morale and discipline, assistance given by the city government since the integration of Police Forces in the country, as well as the peace and order assessments and plans and recommendations.

OPERATIONAL CAPABILITY

The current personnel and logistical capabilities of the Station are as follows :-

A. Personnel Capability

A total of 1,271 officers and men composed the protective strength of the Quezon City Police Station. Sixty one (61) civilian employees perform clerical/ technical functions and ninety five (95) police aides appointed by the City Government are assigned in the different units of the Station, performing non-hazardous tasks. With the current population ratio of 1,615,435, there appears a police ratio of one (1) Policeman per one thousand two hundred sixty two (1:1,262)inhabitants.

Of the total strength of the Station, only 964 comprise its effective strength, while 307 personnel are considered ineffective.

INEFFECTIVE PERSONNEL

The number of ineffective personnel is broken down as follows, to wit:-

1. Sixteen (16) officers and men are carried absent with official leave (AWL);
2. Thirty-five (35) officers and men are undergoing training;
3. Eighty (80) officers and men are presently under suspension;
4. Seventy (70) officers and men are carried sick, who are either confined at the hospital and/or resting at home for recuperation;
5. Thirty (30) personnel are carried absent without official leave (AWL) and appropriate administrative cases were filed against them; and
6. Seventy-six (76) officers and men are carried on detached service with other I N P and military units.

During the period under review, a total of 5445 vehicular accidents occurred in the City and investigated by the Quezon City Police Station. The above comparative data shows that HOMICIDE THRU RECKLESS IMPRUDENCE decreased by 9 cases or 16.66 %. PHYSICAL INJURY increased by 131 cases or 12.78 %, and DAMAGE TO PROPERTY Thru Reckless Imprudence declined by 3901 or 47.31 %.

During the period under review, a total of two thousand seven hundred and seventy one (2771) offenses reported in the City and investigated by the Quezon City Police Station. Of this total, one thousand nine hundred eighty two cases were classified as INDEX CRIMES and seven hundred eighty nine cases belong to the category of NON-INDEX CRIME.

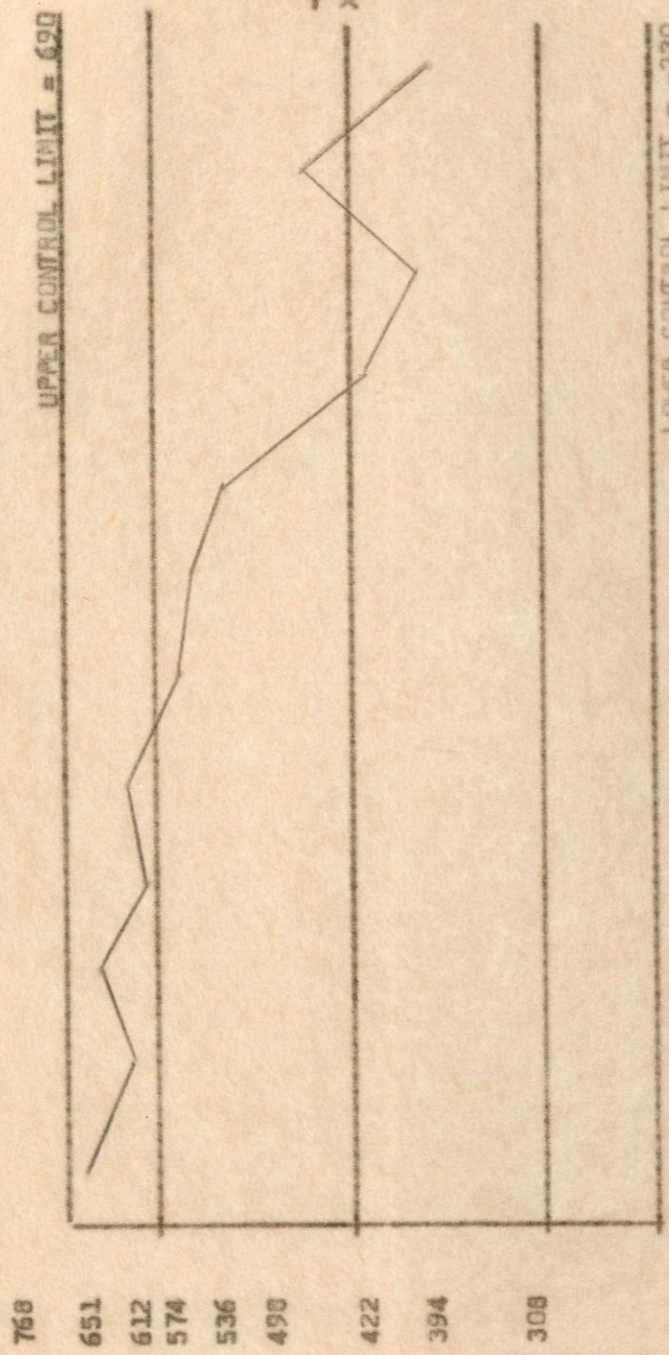
The above comparative data shows that MURDER increased by 8 incidents or 61.53%. Remarkably, HOMICIDE decreased by 53 incidents or 14.44%, PHYSICAL INJURIES decreased by 35 incidents or 18.51%, ROBBERY decreased by 288 incidents or 29.41%, THEFT by 410 cases or 34.16%, and lastly RAPE also decreased by 11 incidents or 47.82%.

DISTRIBUTION OF CASES

During the current period the distribution of cases are as follows :-

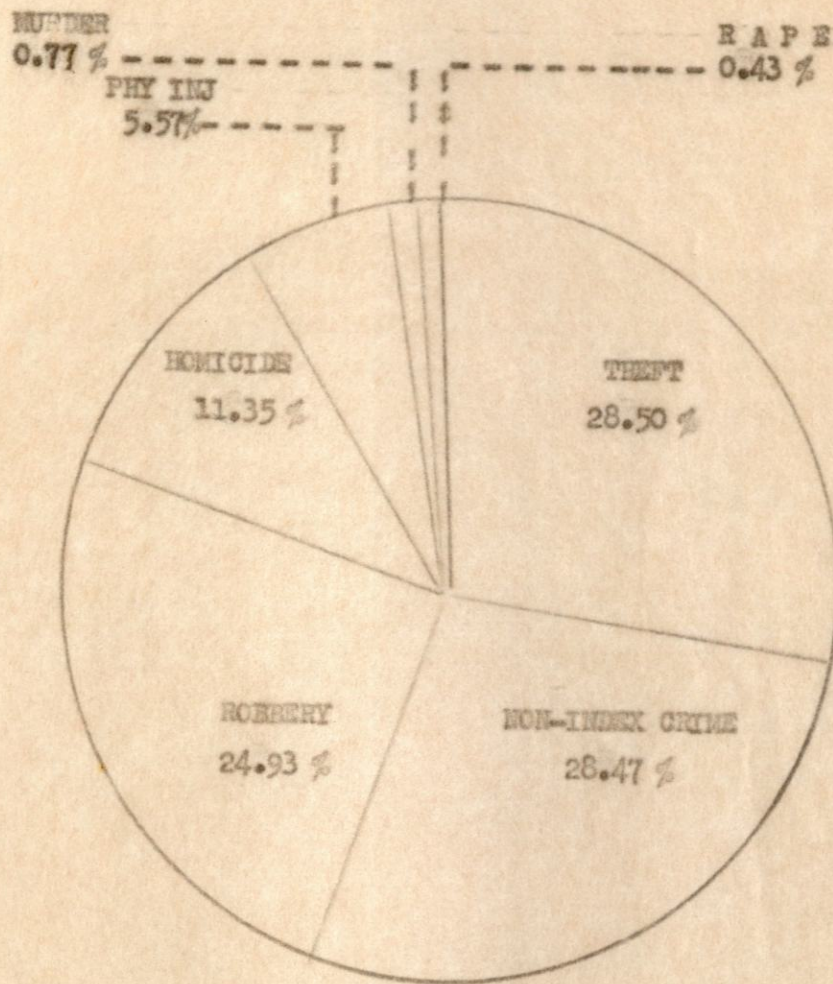
For MURDER, 6 cases are consummated, 14 frustrated and 1 attempted. HOMICIDE, 68 cases are consummated, 214 frustrated and 32 were attempted. On PHYSICAL INJURIES, 23 cases are in the category of serious, 9 less serious and 122 slight physical. Of the total reported ROBBERY cases, 477 were committed against persons and 214 incidents were against things, for THEFT, all reported cases involved P 50,00 and above.

JAN | FEB | MAR | APR | MAY | JUNE | JAN | FEB | MAR | APR | MAY | JUNE



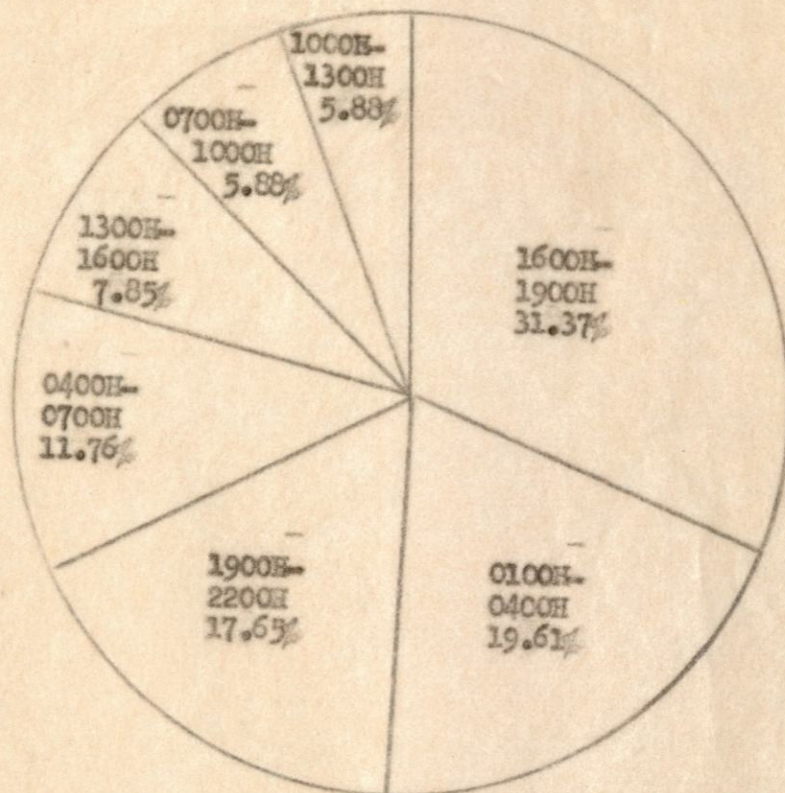
CRIME CONTROL CHART FOR TOTAL CRIME VOLUME

Using previous period as the basis for comparison, crime rate during the first six months of 1981 decreased as compared to the first six months of 1980.



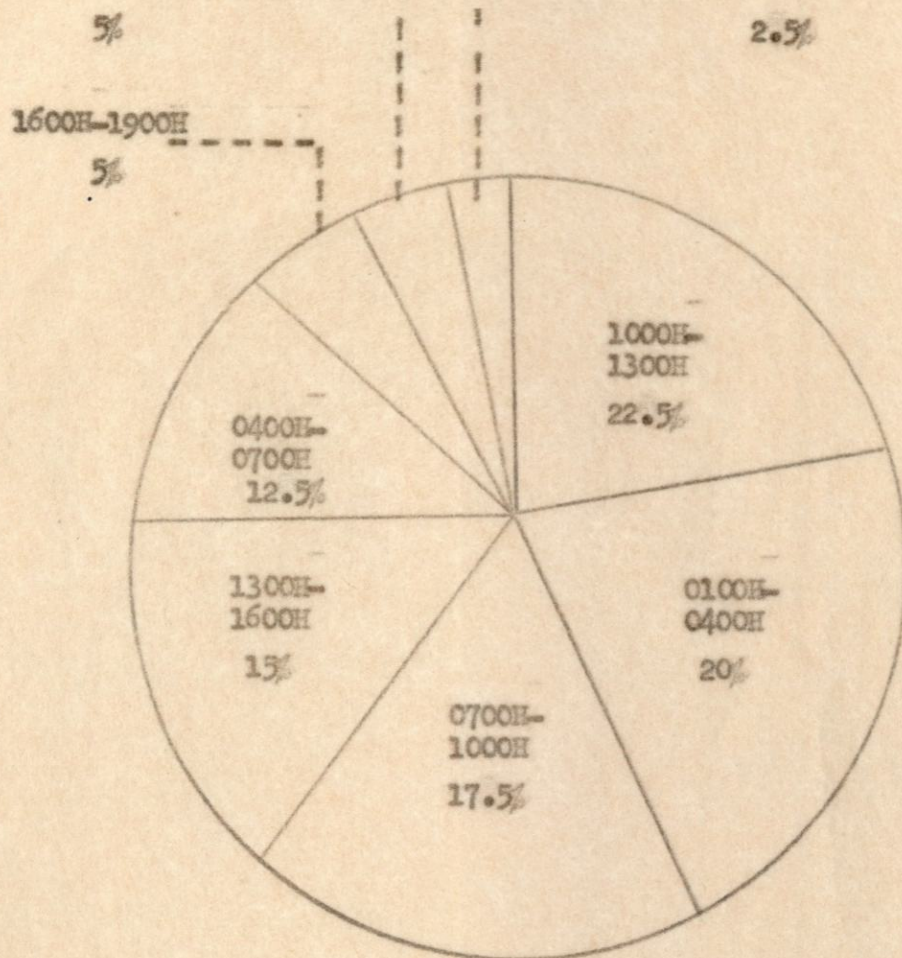
PERCENTAGE OF INDEX and NON-INDEX CRIME

During the period under review, the above pie graph shows that THEFT accounted for the most number of offenses with 28.50% followed by NON-INDEX CRIME with 28.47%, ROBBERY with 24.93%, HOMICIDE with 11.35%, PHYSICAL INJURY with 5.57%, MURDER with 0.77% and accounting for the least is RAPE with 0.43%.



TIME OF OCCURRENCE OF ROBBERY INCIDENTS

For ROBBERY, accounting for the most number of cases is the period from 1600H to 1900H with 31.37% of the total reported cases followed by the period from 0100H to 0400H with 19.61%, 1900H to 2200H with 17.65%, 0400H to 0700H with 11.76%, 1300H to 1600H with 7.85% and lastly, the period from 0700H to 1000H and 1000H to 1300H with 5.88% each.



TIME OF OCCURRENCE OF THEFT CASES

For THEFT, accounting for the most number of incidents committed during the period covered were period from 1000H to 1300H with 22.5% followed by time-span 0100H to 0400H with 20%, time-frame 0700H to 1000H with 17.5%, period 1300H to 1600H with 12.5%, 1600H to 1900H and 2200H to 0100H with 5% each and accounting for the least is the period from 1900H to 2200H with 2.5%

2. Prisoners Rehabilitation Program

- a. Subsistence allowance of inmates -- Each inmate is allotted P 4.00 daily subsistence allowance which covers three (3) balanced meals a day : P1.20 for breakfast, P1.40 for lunch and merienda and P 1.20 for supper. During the period under review, a total of P 367,780.00 has been spent for the subsistence allowance of inmates.
- b. For spiritual guidance of inmates, priests and pastors from different sects takes turns in conducting mass rites, novena or worship from Monday to Sunday. Mass, novena, and Cursillo are being held for Catholic inmates. Volunteers youth religious crusaders from the Catholic, Iglesia ni Kristo, Protestant churches, conducts daily bible sessions and lectures on the love of God, and civic duty for inmates.
- c. It is worth mentioning that during the conflagration that razed the Police Headquarters, last June 5, of this year, inmates were transferred from the City Jail to the adjacent building housing the Philippine Jaycees, and none did try to escape. This cooperation shown by the prisoners, could be attributed to the good relations and rapports between inmates and the police in particular, the programs and guidances established by the Command, the continuous training of jail personnel in the proper handling of inmates, the meting out of appropriate criminal and administrative charges of jail personnel and the spiritual guidance extended by the different church denominations.

B. COMMUNITY GREEN REVOLUTION PROJECTS

Sub-Station 1 has its "Adelina Farm" at Barangay Bagumbayan planted to various vegetables by off-duty personnel of the Sub-Station and residents of the area.

The green revolution endeavor of Sub-Station 2 at Barangay Tatalon. The project now replanted to varieties of vegetables. The tilling, planting and caring of the plots are made possible by both off-duty personnel and constituents of the area.

The most successful among this effort is situated at Barangay Katalahib, maintained by proud members of the Sub-Station 3 and former known trouble-makers, drug dependents, hoodlums and drunkards of the area. From print media, civic organizations, government/educational institutions have paid visit of the site. While some of them donated garden tools and seedlings, others are imparting their technical know how on the proper caring and cultivation of the farm if only to keep the movement on.

The "Adelina Farm" of Sub-Station 4 is situated at Barangay Bahay-Foro.

Considering the vast jurisdictional area of Sub-Station 5 among the six Sub-Stations of the Command, its personnel who are to enjoy their off are often seen with their peers tilling and caring their effort at Barangays Botocan, Pilihan and San Vicente.

Sub-Station 6 has projects located at Barangay Pasong Putik and Barangay Sta. Lucia.

At the City Jail, tomatoes planted on clay pots are mostly arranged fronting the office of the City Warden. Detainees and personnel of the Jail are caring the effort.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

In its commitment to serve the constituents of the City, progressive trends in police service are embodied in Oplan "Lingkod".

A. Police Detachment Concept

To make the police more accessible to the public, Police Detachment in strategic areas within the jurisdiction of this Station were set up and are manned on a 24-hour basis by experienced members of the Station. Each Detachment has its investigators, follow-up team and a detention cell in order to provide prompt disposition of cases/complaints or request for police assistance.

1. Sub-Station 1 Detachment, situated at the intersection of General MacArthur and General Araneta, Araneta Center, Cubao;
2. Sub-Station 1 Detachment, at Kamuning Road corner Judge Jimenez;
3. Sub-Station 3 Detachment, at the Barangay Hall of Unang Sigaw, Balintawak;
4. Sub-Station 2 Detachment, adjacent the Welcome Rotonda;
5. Sub-Station 4 Detachment, along EDSA corner Congressional Avenue;
6. Sub-Station 4 Detachment, at Friendship Circle;
7. Sub-Station 5 Detachment, at Don Mariano Marcos Avenue corner Litex Road; and
8. Sub-Station 6 Detachment, at Lagro Plaza, Novaliches.

B. Mobile Investigation Teams

The operational units of the Station like the Investigation Division, the Intelligence and Anti-Organized Crime Division, the Juvenile Control Division and the Traffic Division has a mobile investigation team that carry out prompt investigation and disposition of all complaints/reports of offenses at the residence or establishment of the victim/complaining party without requiring their presence at the Police Headquarters. The presence of the aggrieved party/complainant is sought only when there are apprehensions made or when the case is to be referred to the inquest Fiscal for preliminary investigation. The mobile investigation teams extend immediate assistance/action in response to complaints/reports or request for police assistance/and the like received either by telephone, letter, telegram and other means of communication.

ON-GOING OPERATIONS

The frequent reports about "tong collection" of some members of the Station, who are allegedly mulcting sidewalk vendors, drivers of public conveyances to include traders from various parts of the country had undoubtedly undermine the faith and confidence of the people if not the integrity of the police to cope with the mounting problem. In order to negate such nefarious activities and in compliance with the directive from Higher Headquarters, the Station has organized a Task Group with the mission of apprehending and prosecuting any member of the Station to include other personnel engage in such nefarious activities.

OPLAN "VIOLENCE METRO '81":-

The arrest of several members of the MNLF, mostly Muslims at Marikina, Metro - Manila, a week before the Presidential Election, and the recovery of several explosives from the safehouse of the said suspects, and their subsequent investigation, reveals that there was a plot of the NPA and in coordination with the MNLF, a nationwide terroristic campaign, particularly within Metro-Manila. The objectives of these groups, are primarily to assassinate the First family, Cabinet Members and high ranking government Officials, and to sow terror and violence among the people by planting bombs and explosives in crowded areas, such as Theatres, shopping centers, government and private buildings.

The revelation of this heinous plot, caused all protective and law enforcement agencies to be on the alert including this command. Conceived as a deterrent ploy, this Operational plan was implemented. Overt and Covert Security details were assigned at crowded areas, such as Government and Private buildings, Theatres and Shopping Centers. Security details and Mobile Patrol Units were assigned in the residences of high ranking Officials of the Government, who are domiciled in the City. Corollary to this, Operational Plan "Primero" was implemented with utmost care and precise supervision, to insure the safety of the First Family, while in transit in Quezon City.

OPLAN "MIMOSA-GARDENIA, 2-B '81":-

In pursuant to the Deputization of the INP members, by the Commission on Election, which was approved in banc by the Board of Commissioners, this Operational plan was conceived in order that proper safety measures could be effected during the Presidential Election, held last June 16, 1981, more particularly in Quezon City.

There are 2,211 voting centers within the 138 Barangays in Quezon City, with an estimated 800,000 persons who registered with the COMELEC, and majority of whom casted their votes last June 16, 1981. Nine Hundred three Officers and men of this command, were utilized in the said Presidential Election, including 33 government owned vehicles and 100 or more privately owned vehicles.

Political assessments were made daily, weeks before the election so that proper planning and deployment could be effected.

Voting centers were covered with overt and covert security details, as well as motorized patrol in nearby areas. Policemen escorted the Election Committee in transporting ballot boxes before and after the election. The Treasurer's Office in the Quezon City Hall was also secured by the elements of this Station during the turnover of ballot boxes and during the canvassing of votes.

As early as twenty four hours, every voting center in the City were sanitized by the Police operatives, in coordination with the Bomb disposal unit of the District Headquarters and PC Metrocom, before a regular details were posted.

Foot and mobile patrol were doubly alert on the persons, pasting subversives and "boycott the election" posters on trees, walls, and fences, as well as graffiti.

Vigilance to insure peace and order during the election was successfully effected by this command, as no untoward incident occurred, except a firecracker was fired at the back of the Quirino Elementary School by allegedly mischievous boy, from the neighborhood.

Expectedly, President Marcos garnered a landslide votes from the constituents. This might be on account of the relentless political campaign waged by Her Honor the Mayor, other City Officials and Barangay Officials, for and in behalf of the President. The "boycott the Election" campaign of the opposition failed to materialize.

OPLAN "ST THOMAS" :-

Under the concept of this Operational plan, the Station has organized a Task Group composing of at least 20 men under the control and supervision of responsible OIC or NCOOIC and from time to time is complemented by elements from the Station Headquarters and are continuously deployed in twos or in pairs in crime prone areas.

Members of the Task Group conducts an aggressive foot/motorized patrol within an specified crime prone area utilizing the KC-20 as the Advanced Command Post where members of the Group radiate and return to the ACP upon completion of its assigned mission.

This crime prevention scheme, has greatly contributed to the sudden decreased of crimes in the City.

OPLAN "SEESAW" :-

Report disclosed an upsurge of crime against property, especially robbery hold-up, and pickpocketing on board public utilities. These nefarious trade has greatly affected the peace and order situation causing great danger to commuters in particular and the public in general. Thus, Oplan "Seesaw" was conceived whereby teams of overt and covert elements of the Station boards public conveyances, especially during rush hours in order to check suspicious personalities and/or apprehend known hold-uppers and pickpockets to include slashers. The Station is also conducting patrol coverages of main thoroughfares.

MORALE AND DISCIPLINE :-

Selected personnel of the Station are continuously recommended for schooling/training in various government entities and other friendly units to take up specified police related courses.

The Station is also continuously inspecting various units to instill among the rank and file a unified command from Headquarters personnel to the last unit operating in the field, and to endow with them the proper discipline proper behaviour and utmost decorum.

ASSESSMENT ON THE PEACE AND ORDER:-

Using the preceeding period as the basis for comparison, TOTAL CRIME VOLUME for the current period decreased by 959 cases or 25.71 per cent, with both INDEX and NON-INDEX CRIMES having a decrease of 789 cases or 28.47 per cent and 170 cases or 17.26 per cent respectively.

PLANS AND RECOMMENDATIONS:-

To effectively carry out its Mission, this Station shall appeal to the INP Hierarchy and the Quezon City Government, for the following logistical and personnel supports:-

1. Immediate provisions, if not immediat re-construction of the Police Headquarters, to house its different Offices, particularly during the rainy season;
2. Replacements of Office equipments, such as typewriters, office tables, chairs, filing cabinets, necessary supplies, such as stapler, ribbons, carbon papers, bond and union skins, folders and envelopes and such other complements needed in the implementation of Police functions;
3. And again, from the Quezon City Administration, through the kind and benevolent instants of Her Honor, the Mayor, a continuing subsidy of the gasoline requirements and maintenance of the patrol vehicles of this command, as well as the immediate implementation of the proposed Police allowances, which was approved in principle by the Honorable Mayor, months ago.
