

NOVEMBER 11, 2001, 8:00 am – 7:00 pm, AMORANTO MULTI-PURPOSE HALL,
SCT. CHUATOCO, BGY. PALIGSAHAN, QUEZON CITY**

II. Opening Ceremonies :

- The National Anthem was led by Ms. Blesilda C. Agpawa of BOC and Ms. Remedios G. Furiscal of CPDO led the Invocation.
- Mr. Rolando P. Montiel, City General Services Officer (CGSO) delivered the Welcome Remarks. He mentioned the objectives of the summit and the sequence of the program. He also introduced the members of the Organizing Committee.
- Hon. Almario E. Francisco, Pres. Liga Ng Mga Barangay presented the Barangay Captains by District.
- Arch. Gerardo G. Magat, City Planning and Development Officer (CPDO) presented the Resource Person on the seven (7) major areas of concern. He also acknowledged the presence of some department/office heads.

III. Conference Proper :

1. Key Features of the Hon. City Mayor's message :

- Given the mandate to lead the governance of the city, the Hon. City Mayor mentioned that he was really looking forward to have a consultation with the barangay leaders because he believed that the total development of the city is dependent on the strong partnership between the city government and its component barangays.
- He preferred workshop activities where there is convergence of new and innovative ideas and perceptions which can serve as basis in preparing an ambitious plan for the city.
- He aspired the city to be a progressive safe and vibrant metropolis – a city that is alive and ever changing for the better.

Colonel COOPER will be assigned to the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD) to serve as the Executive Assistant to the Secretary of Defense (OSD) for Acquisition.

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- He also wanted the city to be business friendly in order to attract productive business/investments to the city.
- On the negative situations in the city like – traffic, garbage, crime, social services, and presence of large number of urban poor, he emphasized that we should uplift them despite the limited resources. Here again, he underscored the necessity to work together to achieve our aspirations for the city.
- With the little resources left, he cited systems and controls to be established for wise spending.
- According to him money is not always the solution to the problem but simple things like common sense, dedication, involvement, creativity and/or innovation to translate problems to solutions.
- He urged both the city government and the barangays to assume their mandate and to exercise consultation processes in order to identify the key problems like – both should know who are the tax delinquents or the situation risks in a particular area.
- His challenge was to work together in a concerted manner guided by a common vision because thru this interface we can attain better inputs to the problem, better management and motivation, better techniques and better cooperation. We can synergize all our efforts into achieving our vision/aspiration for a better Quezon City.

2. Overview of the City Development Thrusts was presented by Arch. Gerardo G. Magat. First, he explained that in all planning efforts for the development of the city, we should be guided by a common vision and the City's Comprehensive Development Program sets the direction to what we like QC to evolve into. He briefly discussed the following:

- a. The city's profile – location, area, population, labor force, trade and industry.
- b. The physical and socio-economic constraints and challenges
- c. The physical and socio-economic potentials and opportunities.
- d. The development vision
- e. The city's development goals
- f. The sectoral plans- physical, social and economic plans/programs.
- g. The seven (7) major priority areas of concern which shall be the topics for discussion during the workshop activities.

- waste management
- public safety
- informal settlers
- infrastructure development
- peace and order

the public budgetary presentation of the city
to the public - will not be able to do so.
The budget is to be presented in a clear and
simple way, so that the public can understand
it easily. This will help to increase the
confidence of the public in the city's financial
management.

With this little introduction, let us now go on
with our discussion of the budget presentation.

First of all, we have to understand what
is meant by a budget. A budget is a financial
plan for a specific period of time. It shows
the expected income and expenditure of
the city for a given period of time.

The budget is prepared by the city government
and is submitted to the state government for
approval. The budget is usually presented
in a simple and understandable language.
It is designed to be easily understood by
the public.

This budget presentation is done in a
convenient manner. The budget is presented
in a clear and concise manner. The
language used is simple and easy to
understand. The budget is presented
in a logical sequence, starting from the
income side and moving on to the
expenditure side.

After the budget is presented, it is
submitted to the state government for
approval. The state government then
approves the budget and it becomes
law. The budget is then implemented
by the city government.

process of communication between
the city government and the
public. It is a process of
sharing information and
making decisions together.

V. Workshop Proper

- The participants were divided into seven (7) discussion groups (DG) and each DG tackled one topic.

- The participants from each group actively took part in the identification of issues, problems and concerns, recommended projects/activities to correspond to the problems and the areas where collaboration with the city government and other government agencies, the private sector and community can be established. They wrote all their ideas/perceptions on the visualization cards and posted them on the manila papers.
- The results of the three (3) workshops were then processed and with the consensus of the participants they selected/finalized the top five (5) outputs for presentation in the plenary. Other outputs were similarly documented for inclusion in the final report.
- After the above activities, the group coordinator discussed the survey forms on socio-economic profile, actual land use and road condition. Each barangay participant was also provided with barangay map.

1. Closing Remarks



A. Influence of the Foreign

- **On Real Property Tax**

He discussed the allocation of collection on Real Property Tax (RPT) and the corresponding shares of the barangay. He also mentioned that if the collection of Real Property Tax increases barangay share on RPT income automatically increases too. He cited the following:

- Tax Amnesty Program – encourage delinquent taxpayers and to avail and pay their back taxes without paying penalties / surcharges
- Auction Sale of Real Properties (Land, House & Machinery) – Series of notices were issued to delinquent tax payers on real properties and publications to newspapers has been made. Auction sale of said properties is set on February 27, 2002.
- The group was requested to help the city by issuing final notices to all delinquent taxpayers within their barangay/jurisdiction.

- **On Permit**

He also mentioned that there are other income that can be derived by the barangay. The following are:

- Business Permit – Thru Barangay Ordinances, businesses with a gross sales of P50,000.00 and below may be collected taxes by barangay.
- Signboard Permit – The barangay can also collect fees inasmuch as the taxing power in signboard permit is exclusively for barangay
- Recreational/Admission Permit – Fees can also collected by the barangay such as on Theaters, Fighting Cocks/Derby Permit and other miscellaneous fee.

- **Community Tax**

- The city government can deputize the Barangay to collect and issue Residence Certificate and Barangay Clearance. Fifty percent (50%) of the collection on said tax go directly to them.

- **IRA**

- IRA is one of the biggest income of the barangay. Shares is based mostly on population, classification (city or municipality) and collections of the BIR
- The second resource speaker was introduced by Dr. Endriga, Mr. Pacifico Maghakot, OIC, BPLO. He explained the procedural requirements in securing and issuing business permits. One of their requirement is the Barangay Clearance, however, a permit can be issued to applicants without same after 7 days without action from the barangay as per RA 7160 or the Local Code. Barangay Captains reacted and suggested that BPLO should wait for a written denial as to why they did not issue said clearance to business applicant.

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- Mr. Alberto Galarpe, the third resource speaker urged the group that they can also generate/increase barangay income by monitoring and reporting to his office business establishments selling liquors without permit issued.
- Mr. Neil Lina, Head of Market Development &Administration clarified to the group that illegal vendors around the market was previously collected and issued tickets by Market Personnel but these was recently stopped.
- Ms. Teofista Pajara, Acting City Assessor, the last resource speaker on the other hand suggested also to the group to report misdeclaration of Real Property from its actual use to their office for proper actions.
- Second part of the workshop was the identification of Problems/Issues and Concerns and each participants were asked to write down their problems/issues and concerns on a visual cards given to them. These cards were later posted in the Manila Paper. Identified Problems/Issues and Concerns are the following:
 - Tax Information: Lack of Barangay Ordinance Passed
 - Lack of Proper Information with regards on Real property Tax (RPT) collections & collectibles
 - Proper assessment/valuation on all RPT as provided by SP Ord. No. 357.
 - Issuance of Business Permit by the Office of the Mayor without Barangay Clearance
 - Illegal collorum of vehicles – What should be done?
 - Proliferation of business which fall to the collections of Amusement Taxes like Video Machines, etc.
 - Tax mapping of Business Establishments and Real Estate Assessment by barangay
 - Theater owner's and other recreational centers which charge admission fees do not pass the Barangay claiming that they already been levied by the City of Amusement Tax
 - The barangay could not pass/enact Regulatory Ordinances on overnight parking on streets, roads and open spaces since only the City Council can do so being the City owner of the property.
 - Pending case against the City Government filed by Barangay Socorro – Case 2000, Trial is set on November 22, 2001, RTC Branch 85 re: Real Property Tax
 - Illegal vendors due to non-payment of permit – what should be done?

With the concensus of the group on the same issues and problems, they arrived at the top five priority problems which are as follows:

- Lack of proper information regarding the power of barangay in Tax Collection
- Issuance of business permits without barangay clearance and vice versa
- No overnight parking fees imposed on car/vehicle owners on the use of streets, roads, open spaces as parking area.


Discussions on the identification of Program/Project Activities to correspond to the identified problems/issues and concern were identified:

- Automatic retention on all clearances, cedulas due to the barangay
- Conduct of tax mapping/inventory of all business establishments, and signboards by the barangay
- Barangay to regulate the use of parks and open spaces within their respective jurisdiction.
- All closure orders of business establishment should be effected through the barangay
- Strict implementation of zoning ordinance

The Areas as Collaboration were also identified to wit:

- Deputization of Barangay officials as agents in the monitoring of delinquent tax payers (real property owners, business establishments & liquor licensing)
- The city government shall set goals for revenue collection per barangay and provide incentives for those who have exceeded their revenue targets
- Coordination with the Assessor's Office for true computation of tax in each property within their area of jurisdiction for "Suyad Buwis"

Mr. Lagasca then discussed the survey forms on socio-economic profile, actual land use and road condition. Each barangay was provided with a barangay map. He also implied that the due date for the submission of said survey forms is on January 15, 2002. The workshop was adjourned.



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE WORKSHOP:

Before the workshop started, an attendance was taken from the participants. Out of 20 Barangays Captains involved only 14 were present. A roll call was made by Mr. Pineda, the group coordinator and likewise introduced group members. He discussed the mechanics of the workshop, followed by the introduction of the Resource Speaker which is Mr. Manny Sabalza, Head of Department of Public Order and Safety (DPOS), this city.

As an opening statement, Mr. Sabalza informed the group that he would present ideas and the participants to develop the same. Before he presented his topics, he requested the group to select their group leader as presenter of the workshop output in the plenary hall. The group unanimously selected Bgy. Captain Ben Santos of Phil-Am.

To continue, he emphasized the importance of DPOS being the communication nerve center for traffic and any disaster occurrence. Such as In cases of floods, the DPOS is aimed to save lives for families living near the creeks/rivers and to ensure continuos traffic flow,

At this point, Bgy. Capt. Ben Santos gave a reaction relative to the insufficient drainage going to Mariblo Creek causing flood along the streets and slow vehicular traffic flow. He suggested that the City Engineer's Office undertake cleaning of canals, the heavily silted creeks and clogged drainage. He likewise stressed out that representation was made to Cong. Calalay to include it in his barangay projects.

Mr. Sabalza continued by showing summary report of flood prone areas. It was reported that there are 376 flood prone areas in the city, in 110 barangays with only 44 evacuation centers. He gave some recommendations were the barangays could help in cases of floods and these are the following;;

He also added the traffic rerouting plan, example given is the rerouting plan at Bgy. Tatalon particularly Araneta Avenue.

He presented statistics on the number of fire/emergency responded. At this point he requested Major Oscar Villegas of the QC Fire Department to discuss the matter.

Concerning fire incidences, Mr. Sabalza cited the following;

Agency's concern;

- Provide clear passage for the firetrucks
- Crowd control
- Assist in the immediate needs of the Bureau of Fire

Bgy. Concern;

- To look fire hydrants status
- Ensure that fire hydrant is not blocked

He cited the example of fire incidence at Bgy. Pinahan. He presented pictures, giving emphasis on the presence of vehicles on the street and narrow streets which hampers the immediate entry of firetrucks.

Recommendation given to the barangay were the following;

- Encourage one (1) side parking to clear roadway
- Provide assistance to the Bu. Of Fire by identifying the nearest fire hydrants in the area
- Man the belonging of the residents

Lastly, he mentioned the presence of dangerous structures and discussed the basic requirements to comply such as secondary exit, stairway, window opening etc. He requested the barangay to report any perceived dangerous structure to DPOS Communication Center for proper action.

The second part of the workshop is the identification of major problems/concerns, projects /activities in the barangay and areas of collaboration. Before proceeding to the first activity, Mr. Pineda reiterated the mechanics of workshop & the time limit. He was assisted by the group facilitator in the distribution of visual cards to the participants to write down their ideas. It was posted later at the Manila Paper for group discussion. The identified major problems/concerns were the following;

- Double parking
- Blocked fire hydrants
- Flood prone
- Illegal spriking
- Fire hazard buildings; St. Joseph College, Trinity College, Rosa Sevilla Memorial School, Jerusalem Elem. School
- Fire hazard
- Traffic congestion no warning signs
- 3-meter creek clearing/dredging
- Inspection of fire hydrants
- Report dangerous structures
- Drainage along V. Luna and Anonas

- Inspect abandoned bldgs, areas occupied by squatters/congested areas

Insufficient warning signs in danger zones and intersections

- Install signages in danger zones and intersections

Occurrence of flood in areas near waterways/clogged drainage

- Request the Engineering Office to undertake de-clogging/rip-rapping of creeks and waterways

For the last activity, in areas of collaboration the participants considered the following;

- Request the congressmen/senators to fund project like construction of drainage and rip-rapping of creeks
- Barangay will provide for the services/workforce, government will take care of the logistics
- Identifying street which can be converted into 1-way street and for the City Council to approved/enact ordinances pertinent to it, to ease traffic congestion

- Identifying street where parking can be allowed and not allowed and for the City Council to approve/enact ordinances for the purpose
- For the government to strictly enforce the laws, ordinances and regulations concerning problems/violations affecting the constituents
- For the barangay to strictly/closely monitor these violations/problems, do action on this, and report to the agencies concerned
- Make sure that proper coordination be done in order to improve the relationship between the government agencies
- All issuances/orders be furnished to the barangays
- Program of activities regarding public safety must be held every year to be spearheaded by city hall/DPOS with participation of barangay officials
- Require the agencies concerned to update the barangay on what actions have been done on the complaints filed in their offices by private individual or barangay
- Identify specific duties/responsibilities of the PNP and the bgy. Tanods in cases of emergencies
- Maintain hand held radios in barangays

After the last activity, Mr. Pineda gave an orientation regarding the survey forms likewise provided each participant with a barangay map for reference.

Cortez (recorder).
- ◆ Ms. Padua discussed the mechanics of the workshop. Said activity is divided into three (3) workshops to wit:

 - 2) identification of programs/projects/activities based on the identified issues; and
 - 3) identification of proposed areas of collaboration between the barangay and the city government.

- ◆ Mr. Ramon T. Asper of the People's Bureau discussed his report on the present situation of the city's informal settlers. He informed the participants of the magnitude of the informal settlers in the city (by District, the largest is in District II, and by barangay) and its location. He also discussed several programs and projects of the City, such as:
 - 1) on-site development (CMP, Direct Sale)
 - 2) off-site development (relocation)
 - 3) containment;as well as their accomplishments, such as:
 - 1) CMP Projects (98 taken-out projects w/ 4,284 beneficiaries)
 - 2) Relocation/Resettlement (48 areas cleared w/ 6,338 beneficiaries).

 - 5) livelihood programs.
- ◆ The last phase is the identification of proposed areas of collaboration, wherein the barangay and the city government had to work out towards development. The group has identified two (2):
 - 1) continuing coordination between the city and the barangay
 - 2) education and information exchange (dissemination, information exchange)
 - ◆ Ms. Padua proceeded with the discussion of the survey, which the concerned barangays have to accomplish as some sort of an "assignment." The survey would be a barangay activity intended to establish data base which would be helpful in formulating programs and projects. This is expected to be completed by January 2002. Ms. Padua presented and discussed the survey forms, which would be used. The forms deal on the socio-economic condition of the household, the actual

land use, and the condition of roads in the barangay. Barangay maps showing the lots and roads which would also be a tool in the survey were distributed to the barangay captains.







II. CALL TO ORDER

Ms. Hanay G. Huaco of City Planning and Development Office (CPO) will introduce the organization of the City Planning and Development Office (CPDO). She will also introduce the District Administrators of the City. Mr. Ed Foncubilla of Bataan Province Governor's Office (GOQ) as the Local Government Unit (LGU) Administrator. Ms. Adrea S. Valente as the Local Government Unit (LGU) Administrator. She will make a formal call to order 15 participants present which includes 10 B6x. Cagayan and 5 Kdagawas.

III. MECHANICAL Introduction of Resource Speaker

Mr. Huaco gave the inauguration of the workshop. She welcomed the speakers and the audience. The first speaker is Mr. Ed Foncubilla of Bataan Province Governor's Office (GOQ) as the Local Government Unit (LGU) Administrator. Ms. Adrea S. Valente as the Local Government Unit (LGU) Administrator. She will make a formal call to order 15 participants present which includes 10 B6x. Cagayan and 5 Kdagawas.

Participants were also informed that the resource speaker will be the discussion group leaders and their key findings from the different areas of their output.

She then presented the speakers of the day, Central Police District (CPD) B/C Sub. Gen. Rodolfo J. Jr.

Gen. Tor delivered succinct yet distinct informations about peace and order. He named various threat groups which causes destabilization of peace and order in the city, such as the Local Communist Members (LCM), the MILF and Abu Sayaff Group, the Pro-Erap Group and other crime groups (kidnap for ransom, akyat bahay gang, hold up/ robbery, carnapper gang, cellphone snatchers and illegal users and pushers). He believed that the purpose of this Barangay Leaders Summit is to come up with standard, concrete and definable plan of actions or solutions to the problems pertaining to the abovementioned threat groups. He also pointed out that in the core of the CPD Office, there is a shortage in facilities and manpower. At present, there are 2,400 policemen tasked to maintain peace and order in the city's 2.17 population. Furthermore, CPD has 67 motor vehicles, of which, half of this number are unserviceable.

V. WORKSHOP PROPER

Nomination of spokesperson among the group ensued. Bgy. Capt. Martin Diño of Bgy. San Antonio was elected to present the three outputs of the workshop at the plenary.

At this point Ms. Furiscal gave a detailed explanation on the mechanics of the workshop using visualization cards.

Cue cards were distributed among the group members and identification of problems and issues pursued.





II. WORKSHOP PROPER

- Mr. Pedro Garcia of City Planning and Development Office introduced the staff involved in the beautification, streetlighting and greening. They include Ms. Lovelia R. 

