## QCLIC and QC Division of City Schools team up for Little Free Library

The Quezon City Public Library (QCPL) has linked up with the QC Division of City Schools in putting up pocket libraries in all 142 public schools. When school librarians attended the Little Free Library (LFL) forum held at QCPL last July 14, no less than the SDO LDRMC Supervisor Ms. Heidee Ferrer and SDO Librarian Ms. Liza Javier led in pledging that the school libraries put up their own LFLs. A month after the forum, 5 schools were able to set their pocket libraries, these are San Francisco ES, Cong. Calalay Memorial ES, Tandang Sora National HS, Pura Kalaw ES and Culiat HS. A lot of schools is calendared to be organized. This collaboration tries to address the problem of pupils' lack of access to books and to promote use of libraries.

## West Philippine Sea in Comics and DVDs



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## Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas Network with Quezon City Public Library

It was June 21, 2016 when the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas Economic and Financial Learning Center (EFLC) Manager Ms. Nelia R. Balagapo personally visited the Quezon City Public Library (QCPL) together with her staff Mr. Rothman Lim.

They came to the library and lay a project proposal to the QCPL City Government Department Head III, Ms. Emelita L. Villanueva which is the Establishment of Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) Library Network. The BSP intended to include different partner libraries from the National Government agencies, academe and local government units (LGU) as well as private entities on this proposed project.

The component is that the BSP will provide the physical book, E-book online and inter library loan (ILL) of BSP publications. On the other hand the network library will just provide a corner for this, catalog the materials provided and quarterly report must be submitted thru online wherein template is provided. This is in order to know the impact it will have for the public client.

To present further the concept and formalized this project the BSP called for a special meeting held at the EFLC, BSP, Malate, Manila on July 14, 2016. This was attended by three of the QCPL personnel.

The forum presented the framework for the BSP Library Network, a program of Cooperation and information resource sharing between BSP and partner libraries. This is to be implemented this year to 2018. The attendees also had the chance to tour the BSP museum.

The EFLC—which houses the BSP Library and the Statistical and Learning Centerserves as the public's focal point of contact in the BSP on information concerning economic and financial matters. It features permanent and changing exhibits and interactive information kiosks on the responsibilities and functions of the BSP and its role in the Philippine economy, with particular emphasis on the three pillars of central banking: maintaining price stability, promoting financial stability, and ensuring a safe, sound and efficient payments and settlements system. Researchers also have access to economic and financial data series produced and monitored by the BSP, either in hard copy format or in downloadable electronic version. Apart from its collection of books, journals and periodicals on specialized topics of banking, fi-

nance and economics, the EFLC's library secalso has an electronic research system comprising of the digitized version of BSP publications, e-books and online subscription to maior research portals. Other facilities available to the public include the following: multi-media research terminals which provide access to the internet and to various audio-visual materials, games and interactive learning modules; an audio-visual room where lectures and briefings on various topics of central banking are conducted; and an information help desk to attend to queries and information requirements of research-By providing these information services, programs and materials, the EFLC symbolizes the BSP's corporate commitment to institutionalize and promote a comprehensive economic and financial education for the Filipino public.

Street children are probably used to being turned away everywhere they go, but there is at least one place where they are welcomed with open arms: the Quezon City Library and Information Center (QCLIC).

Also known as the **Quezon City Public Library**, the QCLIC can be found in the Quezon City Hall compound in Diliman.

Every day, according to a statement from the Quezon City Public Af fairs and Information Office (PAISO), at least ten street kids visit the library, where they read books, color illustrations, play, and watch educational videos with the guidance of

library staff and volunteers.

"Aside from teaching them how to read, we listen to their life stories and sentiments, give inspiring advice if needed," Villanueva added.

#### How important is punctuality?

#### WHY IT MATTERS

Some have found that arriving at appointments a bit ahead of time actually reduces stress. Punctuality also enhances a person's reputation. How so?

Punctuality indicates competence. When you are on time, it shows that you try to be in control of your life instead of allowing circumstances to prevent you from doing the things you want to do. Punctuality suggests dependability. In a society where promises are often broken and commitments frequently ignored, people appreciate those who stick to their word. Dependable people earn respect from friends and family. Employers value those who arrive on time for work and meet deadlines. Dependable workers may even be rewarded with a higher salary and greater trust.

#### WHAT THE BIBLE SAYS

There are passages in the Scriptures that relate to punctuality. For instance, the Bible says: "Let all things take place decently and by arrangement." (1 Corinthians 14:40) When two parties agree to meet at a specific time and place, it is decent and proper for them to be punctual. The Bible also says: "There is an appointed time for everything, a time for every activity under the heavens." (Ecclesiastes 3:1) The context of this verse says that there is "a time to plant and a time to uproot." (Ecclesiastes 3:2) Farmers plant crops at the right time, on time, in order to yield the best possible harvest. In other words, the farmer's punctuality yields good results.

The Bible reveals a more noble reason for being punctual: It shows respect for others and their precious time. (Philippians 2:3, 4) By contrast, those who constantly make others wait could in effect be stealing their time.

"Look out not only for your own interests, but also for the interests of others."—Philippians 2:4. What can you do to be punctual?


#### WHAT THE BIBLE SAYS

The Bible encourages advance planning. (<u>Proverbs 21:5</u>) If you find that you are regularly late for appointments, perhaps your schedule is too full. Why not cut nonessential time wasters? Schedule more time between appointments, and aim to arrive early. This will allow for unexpected circumstances, such as traffic congestion or bad weather.

The Bible also encourages modesty. (<u>Proverbs 11:2</u>) This means knowing your limitations. Decide whether an appointment or deadline will realistically fit your schedule before agreeing to it. By overbooking, you add stress and frustration—to yourself and to others!

The Bible further tells us to make the best use of our time. (<u>Ephesians 5:15, 16</u>) Give priority to the most important tasks. (<u>Philippians 1:10</u>) For example, while using public transportation or waiting for others, take advantage of the time by catching up on reading or by planning the rest of your day. (Awake! No. 6 - 2016)




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## Local History Section Introduces Filipiniana Trivia

The Month of August is one of the most anticipated months for the Filipinos for this month celebrates the "Buwan ng Wika" (Filipino Language Month) especially to the Quezon City residents as Manuel L. Quezon, founder of the city named after him, is popularly known as "Ama ng Wikang Filipino" (Father of Filipino Language).



Most of the schools and other institutions commemorate this by having special activities that manifest the love for the language such as *Balagtasan*, where two people, sometimes two groups, exchanges poetical statements to give their side for a given argument, *Dulaan*, where Filipinos used the language to perform in a stage act, *Sarsuela*, a Filipino version of a musical, and a lot more.

This year 2016, in celebration of the "Buwan ng Wika", the Local History and Filipiniana Section introduced the Filipiniana Trivia, a weekly activity that provides questions featuring interesting facts about Manuel L. Quezon. Being able to mix up the traditional and modern ages, we posted the questions on an artistically created board. Winners are notified through electronic messages. Their photos are also posted on Facebook to add more publicity and promote the activity as well.

The first week featured the question "Ano ang buong pangalan ng Ama ng Lungsod Quezon?" (What is the full name of the Father of Quezon City?) which was answered correctly by a student from ICCT, Ervin Rommel Luzong. "Ano ang unang ipinangalan ni Dating Pangulong Manuel L. Quezon sa EDSA?" (What is EDSA's first name given by Former President Manuel L. Quezon?) is the featured question on the second week. The answered given by students namely Ruth Templonuevo and Abegail Tolledo proves to be the correct answer – 19 de Junio.

The third week's question is "Ano ang pangalan ng Kalakan na unang pinili ni Pangulong Quezon para maging Hepe ng Pulisya ng Lungsod Quezon noong 1939?" (What is the name of the Lt. Colonel chosen by President Quezon to be the first Chief of Police?) a 17 year old student, Mac Andrei G. Bautista, is the only participant to answer the question correctly by the answer Dwight David Eisenhower. The first three weeks' questions really persuaded the young ones to join the last week of the trivia which featured the question "Kailan dumating sa Maynila ang labi ng Pangulong Manuel Quezon matapos itong manatili sa Amerika ng ilang buwan?" (When did the wake of President Quezon arrived in Manila after it had stayed in America for a few months?) and the answer is July 27, 1946 which was answered by few students.

Aside from the promotion of the Filipiniana and Local History Section, the activity also emphasizes the importance of loving and patronizing of your own language and the knowledge of knowing the history. This activity was made possible by Ms. Rowena G. Remiendo and Ms. Esmeralda Cadeliña with the supervision of Ms. Lucila R. Raquiño, Head of the Reader's Services.

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### City Wide Records Management Seminar

The City General Services Department (CGSD) sponsored a city wide seminar for all Records/Admin Officers of the Executive and Legislative Departments entitled "Updates on RA 9470 and E-Archiving Seminar/Workshop" last September 2-3, 2016 held at the Subic Bay Travelers Hotel & Event Center in Subic, Zambales.

Mr. Rolando P. Montiel, Head of the City General Services Department, cited in his Opening Remarks that Records Management is a tool in public administration and the use of 3E's (Economy, Effectiveness, Efficiency) in managing records is very important. He also announced that there will be an audit to all records of the different departments/offices to be conducted by the National Archives of the Philippines (NAP) so as for everybody to be prepared and well informed, which is the purpose of this seminar.

The seminar highlighted some updates on RA 9470, which is an act to strengthen the system of management and administration of archival records, establishing for the purpose the National Archives of the Philippines, and for other purposes, or, most commonly known as the "National Archives of the Philippines Act of 2007". The General Records Disposition Schedule common to Local Government Units Series of 2011 was given emphasis, as well as some technological innovations in records management was also discussed during the seminar.

There were two (2) Resource Speakers who were experts in the field namely: Ms. Ma. Teresa A. Pagaragan, Sr. Records Management Analyst from the National Archives of the Philippines and Ms. Efer Jhan Margarett I. Santos-Nierras, Information Governance Records and information Management Specialist from Manulife.

This event also gave way to form an organized group of all records officer/personnel of the City, in order to assist those in need of managing/organizing records in each offices. This was done through election and the result was as follows:

The objective of the seminar was to enhance the attitudes and skills of every employees as public servants, as well as in preparation of the office to pass the quality standards demanded by the International Organization for Standardization (ISO).

The Resource Speakers were experts in their own fields composed of Ms. Ana Marie G. Ocampo – Training Assistant, Mr. Ronald L. Tan – Acting HRMO V and Director Cardito L. Callangan – HR Consultant, all from our very own Human Resource Management Department. Kudos to Ms. Marlene S. Aguilar, Head of the HRMD for allowing her staff to share their expertise and knowledge to us.



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### Conference Workshop on Gender and Development By: Ms. Janet B. Alday

The Office of the Mayor and the Gender and Development Council con ducted a Conference-Workshop on Gender And Development (GAD) Basic Concepts, GAD Analysis and Mainstreaming and GAD Plan ning and Budgeting last August 30-September 1, 2016 held at Prime Asia Hotel, Angeles City, Pampanga.

The objectives of the Training are to develop a basic understanding of gender analysis and its benefits; to become familiar with gender analysis tools, approaches and data; to familiarize with the Objectives, Principles, Application and features of the Harmonized Gender and Development Guidelines (HGDG); and lastly, to be able to come up with the 2017 GAD Plan and Budget using the new form issued by the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG)

The Conference Workshop was attended by the GAD Focal Person of different Departments/Offices of the Quezon City Government. Ms. Janet B. Alday as the GAD Focal Person of the Quezon City Public Library (OCPL) attended the said Conference.

On the first day of the training, Ms. Bernadette E. Demillo, Local Govt. Operations Officers VI, QC GAD Focal Person, one of our lecturers, discussed GAD Concepts, GAD Mandates, Gender Analysis and Mainstreaming. In the Afternoon session, Mr. Jonathan Garbo from QC-DILG, discussed the Harmonized Gender and Development Guidelines (HGDG), wherein he said that HGDG, is a tool to ensure that programs and projects undertaken by the government in their various stages are gender responsive. The formulation and development of the HGDG was initiated by National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA), National Commission on the Role of Filipino Women (NCRFW), Official Development Assistance—Gender and Development(ODA-

GAD) Network with funding assistance from UNDP and ADB in 2004 to ensure that programs and projects of the government are gender responsive. He also added, that there are three (3) features of the HGDG and these are the following: 1) Program / Project Develop Guidelines - Set of guidelines in the form of questions which can be applied to program development in general regardless of sector or project



(2)Sector Specific Design Guidelines - Set of guidelines for the Development of Sector-Specific programs or projects; 3) Program / Project Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation – Guidelines

for the Management, Implementation, Monitoring

and Evaluation of Development projects.

On the second day, Ms. Demillo, discussed GAD Planning and Budgeting. After her presentation, the participants were grouped according to its cluster and in the afternoon session, each grouped presented their output using the new form for Annual GAD Plan and Budget. Each cluster was able to identify the Gender issue or mandate, GAD Objective, GAD Activity, Perfor mance Indicator and Target, GAD Budget and Lead or Responsible Office. The workshop helped us a lot to really understand the GAD Planning and Budgeting.



On the last day of the training, continuation of discussion regarding the Identification of Gender Issues in LGU's and possible relevant Purchase Price Allocation (PPA's) was the highlight of the program. After the training, the program ended with a closing Ceremony and there was a photo to all



izing and conducting this kind of train ing, we as a GAD Focal Person learned a lot and gain more

insights.

Vallejo, the project leader and historical researcher conducted the discussion and free demonstration on accessing the digitized files on Filipino Guerilla particularly on BGen Francisco Licuanan Jr. Memorial Collection of Philippine Guerilla files from the US National Archives. These 280,000 records have been extensively scanned, uploaded and made available for researchers, history teachers and libraries.

The activity was attended by our staff specially the senior citizens, members of the Quezon City senior citizen's association and other library clients. The Philippine Veterans Affairs Office (PVAO) Filipino War Veterans Foundation and Geo Estate Development Corporation who leads the project sent Mr. Marlon Peralta to witness the said activity and impart some important message from the said agency. Also, some staff from the Veterans Bank are present.

This activity was made possible by the City Government Department Head III, Ms. Emelita L. Villanueva nad Asst. City Librarian, Ms. Cynthia DJ Tolado. The visitors and participants were warmly welcomed by Ms. Lucila R. Raquinño, Head of Reader's Services.

Tolado, Section Heads in the main library and the Branch District Coordinators were very privileged to be invited in the Lakbay Aral program last September 9, 2016 by the office of Councilor Allan Benedict S. Reyes. Some of his staff were included too. We had assembled at the City Hall Compound and his bus took us all at the location. We traveled for only one hour and when we got there, we were welcomed by the LPU's Librarians in-charge. We were introduced to them by Councilor Reyes and after that she toured us in the university library.

When we got there, many students and reviewees were using the library because it was their exam week. It has 3 floors that is modernly built and with glass walls. What catches our eyes is the unique "C shape" book shelf that is patterned in a logo of a signature brand. A modern coffee shop is within the library also and has conference area too. It is surrounded with couches and sofa for the readers to feel comfortable while studying. Their OPAC is touch screen so that readers can easily access to the books they need. Since it has 3 floors, the library has a book lift elevator that transfer books from a floor to another. When we got to the MIS of the library, we were amazed to see a lot of computer units. Many were using the area at that time. It occupies half of the whole 2nd floor. They actually called it the Electronic Library.

After the library tour, we headed to Bayleaf Hotel. This is also owned by the LPU Cavite. We had a short round in the place. Unlike before when I visited the place, it is already finished and preparing for their grand opening. We had lunch at Tagaytay after that.

This educational tour helped us to see and understand current trends of a modern library.

### **QCPL** on Bloomfield Software Training Workshop at NLP

Executive Director of Molave Development Foundation, Dr. Angelo Juan O. Ramos gave an overview of the seminar/workshop. They have been partnered with the National Library of the Philippines (NLP) for four (4) years, under Beyond Access. Their own perspective is that few are coming to the library so, they look for ways for it to become more relevant around the Philippines like that of modern public library services.

The Bloomfield is geared to creation of local content. Upon discussion with the Department of Education (DepEd) they thought of using the mother tongue. Since Philippines has 170 languages DepEd focused on eighteen languages like that of Tagalog, Cebuano, Ilokano, Bicolano and others which covered 98% of the popula tion. "Bloomfield" which means " more

It was done already in Region I, in Ilokano language wherein in a couple of months they made 500 books using this software.

The National Library of the Philippines is encouraging each public library to come up with their own goals and targets (e.g. 1,000 in 18 languages) to create books in different languages. Example is in local history. Each book produced can have its own ISBN from the NLP.

books to bloom" is up to it.

Essentially the technology is the least challenging, what to put in is a lot more



interesting. The software can be installed on version 7 up and in electronic library and can be accessible to anyone. Just make sure to practice not violating copyright. Actually, it can detect copyright violations.

Ms. Irma F. Saligumba facilitates the production of books using bloom. She acknowledged first all the participants from NCR. She said, since June 2016 Urdaneta plus two municipal libraries, Villasis and Sta. Barbara produced children and supplementary books in Pangasinense.
